Course Description

This course is an introductory examination of the underlying ideas, principles, and participatory practices in the governance of the United States and Texas. Specifically, this course will focus on introducing the historical, social, political, cultural, and global forces that continue to shape our understanding of the relationship between the people and government. Topics considered include civil liberties, civil rights, constitutionalism, federalism, ideology, pluralism, political culture and socialization, political parties and interest groups, public opinion, republicanism, and finally voting and electoral politics.

Please note that you will not be taught what to think about political issues in this course. Rather, you will be provided with the knowledge base to determine how to think about political issues for yourself.

Student Learning Outcomes

Critical Thinking

1. Students will be able to differentiate between fact and opinion.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Attendance:

Your attendance in class is mandatory. Students are required to attend all scheduled classes, and therefore, attendance will be taken during every class. In accordance with University policy and procedures, students with more than three (3) absences may be administratively dropped from the course. “Excused” absences will be granted for official university activities and severe medical issues, assuming the student submits proper documentation within a timely manner.

After your third unexcused absence, I will deduct 4 points per missed class period (2 points from your attendance grade and 2 points from your participation grade).

Participation & Current Events:

Students should remain informed of current events throughout this course, especially in current political events involving the U.S. and/or Texas. We will be discussing current events in class and it helps when students are aware of these events. I will advise you to acquire your news from (mostly) unbiased news outlets such as BBC News, CSPAN, Reuters, and Al Jazeera America (all free online). TV News Networks such as CNN, MSNBC, and Fox News are fun to watch occasionally, but they are mostly entertainment shows about the news (just like The Daily Show, but without the comedy); please use caution and your best discretion when you view them.

Exams and Quizzes:

In this course, all students are required to take **four (4)** exams and **four (4)** quizzes . Each exam is worth 150 points and each quiz is worth 38 points out of a possible total of 1000 points for the overall class. There is NOT a final exam in this course. Any missed exams or quizzes will receive **zero (0)** points.

If you have a **legitimate reason** for missing an exam (e.g. severe illness or injury requiring professional medical care, emergencies in your immediate family, participation in official university activities, legal obligations) **AND** you have **supporting documentation** for your absence, then you may **request** to take that exam at a later date.

Requests for taking the exam due to an excused absence must be submitted electronically. You must submit documentation to me explaining and substantiating why the absence was legitimate. An approval to take the make-up exam will be based solely upon the professor’s evaluation of your request and supporting documentation. You may only make up **one (1)** missed exam. Any other missed exams will receive scores of zero (0), irrespective of the circumstances.

Late or missed quizzes will not be accepted, irrespective of the circumstances.

Class Project (Essay):

There will be a class project which shall consist of a simulation of Congress and a research essay. I will provide you with specific instructions and further information about this later on in the semester.

Word Processing Program:
