Course Description:

This introductory course is an examination of the underlying ideas, principles, and participatory practices of constitutional government in the United States and the state of Texas. This course will acquaint you with the historical, social, political, cultural, and global forces that were present during the foundation of the American political system and continue to impact national and statewide political activity today.

You will not be taught *what* to think about political issues. You will be provided the knowledge base to determine *how* to think about political issues for *yourself*.

Learning Objectives:

1. Students will be able to differentiate between fact and opinion.
2. Student communication will be clear, purposeful, and make appropriate use of evidence, data and technology as applicable.
3. Students will understand and practice academic honesty.
4. Students will demonstrate awareness of societal and/or civic issues.

Assignments and Grades:

1. Examinations: There will be four examinations for a total of 400 points.
If you miss an exam, you will receive a 0 for that exam. If you have a legitimate reason for missing an exam (illness, family emergency, etc) and you have *supporting documentation* for your absence, then you may *request* a make-up exam upon providing the professor said documentation. You are *not* guaranteed a make-up exam.
Make-up exams are permitted at the sole discretion of the instructor.

2. Participation: 25 points.
Participation is not simply showing up to class and entertaining yourself on an electronic device. (Refer to the electronics policy.) Participation consists of having read the material and being prepared to answer questions and contribute to meaningful class discussion over the readings.

Participation levels include:

1. Always contributes to class discussion
2. Regularly contributes to class discussion
3. Sometimes contributes to class discussion
4. Never to rarely contributes to class discussion

Your participation grade may be severely reduced by the way you act in class.

For example: sleeping, disturbing your classmates by having a private discussion with your friends, consistently being late to class, listening to music, or anything that would have me believe that you are not fully engaged with our class discussion.

3. Attendance: 25 points.
Students are required to attend class and attendance will be taken during each class session using a sign-in sheet. You can miss up to three class sessions on non-exam days without penalty. **More than three absences will result in a reduction in your grade.** *The only absences that will not be counted against you are those directly related to school activities when I am provided with a note from the appropriate department.* **If you have another student sign in for you, there will be serious repercussions. Please refer to the academic dishonesty section.** Your education is your responsibility and if you would like to know what you missed, please inquire from one of your fellow students. I will not send you notes over what was discussed.

Attendance Grade Scale

- 0 absences = add 10 points to your grade
- 1-3 absences = no penalty
- 4-6 absences = deduct 7.5 points from your grade
- 7-9 absences = deduct 12.5 points from your grade
- 10 or more absences = deduct 25 points from your grade

1. Quizzes/Writing Assignments: 50 points.

There will be a quiz or writing assignments given over the course of the semester. Pop quizzes may be given in class in the event of a violation of the electronics policy or improper class behavior. **If you are not in class, you will not receive credit for the assignment missed.** *If you show up after the quiz has started, you cannot receive credit for that quiz.*

The scale used in calculating final grades is as follows:

- F: 000-299 points

Caveat: As instructor, I reserve the right to amend, modify, or adjust this syllabus as needed.

Electronics Policy: Cellular telephones, tablets, laptops, and other such devices must be turned off and put away during class. Man lived without the internet and cell phones for thousands of years. You *will* survive one class period. If you are caught using a device, it may be taken from you. If you are repeatedly caught using a device, it may result in a deduction from your participation grade and since you will be kicked out of class for that day it will count as an absence. *As your instructor, I reserve the right to respond to any phone call, text message, or social media post that is “important” enough to interrupt class.*

Academic Dishonesty: Any student who is caught committing any kind of academic dishonesty will receive an “F” in this course and will be reported to the University administration. “Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, plagiarism (the appropriation or stealing of the ideas or words of another and passing them off as one’s own), cheating on exams or other course assignments, collusion (the unauthorized collaboration with others in preparing course assignments), signing the attendance sheet for a student who is absent (or asking another student to sign you in when you are absent), and abuse (destruction, defacing, or removal) of resource material” (Texas A&M University-Commerce Procedures A13.12). If you have any doubt as to what may constitute academic dishonesty, please consult with me *prior* to submitting any assignments.

Campus Carry: Texas Senate Bill - 11 (Government Code 411.2031, et al.) authorizes the carrying of a concealed handgun in Texas A&M University-Commerce buildings only by persons who have been issued and are in possession of a Texas License to Carry a Handgun.
