#### **Course Description**

An introduction to the laws, philosophies and theories of ESL schooling with an emphasis on the evolution of language policy and the sociological, psychological, and legal implications. Students will gain knowledge of effective oral language and literacy practices for English Language Learners in grades K-12. Provides students with opportunities to reflect on their own language learning and schooling experiences then compare them to practices shown by research to be effective. 3 semester hours.

## Student Learning Outcomes

The student will ...

1. identify and understand theories of L1 and L2 acquisition and development.
2. understand the role of culture in language development and academic achievement.
3. assess the language proficiency of an English learner in English and Spanish.
4. value bilingualism, biliteracy and multiculturalism and become an advocate for English learners.

### Course Objectives:

This course is designed to help prepare students for the English as a Second Language Supplemental (#154). We will focus on the following standards for the Supplemental tests:

**English as a Second Language:** The ESL teacher ...

- Standard I: understands fundamental language concepts and knows the structure and conventions of the English language.
- Standard II: has knowledge of the foundations of ESL education and factors that contribute to an effective multicultural and multilingual learning environment.
- Standard III: understands the processes of first- and second-language acquisition and uses this knowledge to promote students' language development in English
- Standard IV: understands ESL teaching methods and uses this knowledge to plan and implement effective, developmentally appropriate ESL instruction.
- Standard V: has knowledge of the factors that affect ESL students' learning of academic content, language, and culture.

### **1. Attendance/Participation: (35% of total course grade):**

Attend all class sessions, be on time, and stay the entire time. Read all assigned chapters and supplementary readings before they are due, complete all outside assignments, participate in discussion both in small & large group and exhibit all other aspects of professionalism required by the profession.

Student Learning Outcomes: The student will...

#1: identify and understand theories of L1 and L2 acquisition and development.

#2: understand the role of culture in language development and academic achievement.

### **2. Quizzes: 2 quizzes (10% of total course grade):**

The student will have one week to complete each online quiz. Students will be allowed to take the quiz multiple times, so that they can obtain a 100% score, at which point they will be awarded full credit.

Student Learning Outcomes: The student will...

#1: identify and understand theories of L1 and L2 acquisition and development.

#2: understand the role of culture in language development and academic achievement.

Assessment Method: Multiple-choice, true/false and matching items

### **3. Discussion Forums: 5 discussion forums (25% of total course grade)**

Participate in online discussion forums over selected bilingual/ESL issues. Students will be required to post an initial discussion of at least 400+ words to the assigned topic and respond to another two students' initial posting with 50+ word response for each. The

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initial discussion response may be submitted up to one week late, but peer responses will not be accepted late. The initial response will be due on Tuesday of the assigned unit and the two responses will be due Thursday of that week.

Student Learning Outcomes: The student will...

#1: understand and apply theories of L1 and L2 acquisition and development.

#2: value bilingualism, biliteracy and multiculturalism and become an advocate for English learners.

Assessment Method: Discussion rubric. Discussion postings must be substantive or the student will not be given full credit, if it is apparent to the professor that students have not spent enough time or effort in writing the responses. For example, "I agree. You are absolutely right," does not constitute a substantive response.

#### **4. SIOP Based Lesson Plan & Demo: (20% of total course grade):**

Students will work with one or more partners to create a lesson plan in English and demonstrate selected activities from it. The plan will include listening, speaking, reading and writing activities. The rest of the class will role play students and complete a rubric to provide the demonstrators with some feedback on their lesson delivery.

Student Learning Outcome: The student will learn to make instructional decisions that target the instructional needs of English learners, document them using a lesson plan, and deliver the lesson to their peers.

Assessment Method: **Lesson Plan & Demo Rubric**

#### **5. Midterm Exam: (10% of total course grade);**

Students will take a final exam over the content of the text and other resources provided throughout the course.

### Late turn-ins:

- All assignments are to be completed and uploaded by midnight on the day they are due. For each day the assignment is submitted late, 5% will be subtracted from the total grade. Quizzes and peer responses will not be accepted late.

- Quizzes and peer responses will not be accepted for late credit.

**The quizzes** will be available online 7 days prior to their due dates. You will have multiple attempts to take the quiz the week before it is due. You will have a time limit to

Upon submission you will immediately get a numeric score report which will tell you the number of questions missed, but not which questions. **The day after** the testing window is closed you will be able to return to the exam, seeing which items you got correct and which you missed. **Quizzes cannot be taken late.**
