The course considers the patterns of "teenage" growth and development and the factors which influence them.

2. Reflect upon your own adolescent years with a new perspective.
3. Incorporate knowledge from this class into your own interactions with teenagers.
4. Understand the roles of social and cultural contexts in adolescent development.

ASSESSMENTS

1) Pop Quizzes

Pop quizzes and in-class writing assignments may happen throughout the semester, asking you to reflect on what we have discussed in class. These should help you keep up to date with the readings and keep the material fresh. Pop quizzes are worth 5% of your grade.

2) Adolescent Reflection Paper

Teenage years can be an awkward, weird time where people gain independence and form the sort of identity that they will be apart of them throughout the lifespan. As such, teenagers experiment, get emotional, defensive, and passionate about things that their adult selves may laugh or cringe at later. This paper is an opportunity to consider and reflect upon your teenage self with the benefit of new knowledge and perhaps different perspectives to explain why you behaved as you did and believe the things you believed. Using examples from your physical, emotional, and social development as well as peer-reviewed papers, you will explain why you acted as you did. The Adolescent Reflection Paper will be worth 20% of your grade.

3) Exams

There will be a total of four exams throughout the semester. Each exam will cover the material covered since the last exam. There will **not be a cumulative final**. Your lowest exam grade will be dropped. Exams are worth 75% of your final grade, or 25% an exam.

4) Research Participation (Bonus)

You can earn bonus points by participating in research studies offered through the SONA system. Researchers at this university, ranging from surveys to laboratory experiments, conduct the studies offered. Your participation is greatly appreciated and is a great help to faculty and fellow students at this university. Information about signing up for SONA and participating in experiments will be available in Doc Sharing on eCollege, and I will take time early in the semester to go over how to access the system.

Absence and tardiness policies

1. Your pop quizzes will function as your attendance. It is important that you attend class so you do not miss a quiz.

Research Participation

As part of the course, you will have the opportunity to participate in research. This will be optional, and count as an extra credit opportunity. If you choose to participate in research, you must complete a minimum of 1.5 credit hours of research.

1. SONA grants credits on a time basis. A 15-minute study grants .25 credits, a 30-minute study grants .50 credits, etc.
2. Every .50 credit hours you complete and assign to this class will be worth .5 points.
3. There is a maximum limit to the amount of credit hours you can assign to this course. The limit is 10 credits, which will be equal to 10 points or 10 percentage points.
4. More than 2 (3+) unexcused no shows as indicated by the SONA system (I can see no shows), will result in no extra credit being assigned.
