**Course:** This class will include a general review of the history of psychology, but will mainly focus on the development and evolution of theories both within and across different content areas of psychology. It will also provide you with an opportunity to read some original source material.

**Format:** Like face-to-face classes, online courses can be assembled in many different ways. In this class there are 15 units (see below) and each unit has 1-6 objectives/questions. It is up to you find the answers to those objectives/questions and then provide a short summary of those answers as a discussion post.

*Having said that, a **gloss from the "wiki" does not count as having found the answer...***

For many of the objectives/questions the "answer" will be obvious when you do the assigned reading. Others are designed for you to *locate material on your own* – the idea being, then, that different students will make very different contributions – creating a diverse, and high quality, discussion.

**Pace:** Feel free to work as fast as you want to. Each month's topics will open at the same time, and you will have approximately one month to complete these topics before they close. I do ask that you complete the topics in order, as they are designed to "build" off of each other. Do note that, given the amount of reading, this is not a class that you can "put off." Also, make sure to do **all** the objectives for a given unit.

**UNITS WILL SHUT DOWN ACCORDING TO THE DUE DATES INDICATED.**

Once a unit has been closed, you will not be able to work on it further.

**Texts:** *Connections in the History and Systems of Psychology*, Thorne & Henley, 3rd edition.

In addition to the textbook you will be asked to do **a lot** of reading from sources you can find on the Internet **and** from six original texts. Everyone should read the following:

Marcus Aurelius, *Meditations*

Charles Darwin, *Expression of the Emotions in Man and Animals*

B. F. Skinner, your choice – but approve through me

Sigmund Freud, your choice – but approve through me

Viktor Frankl, *Man's Search for Meaning*

Stephen Gould, *The Mismeasure of Man*

*A note about the textbook: In undergrad classes this book is often covered in its given order. Here, we are "jumping around." Having said that, the reading is cumulative. That is, material assigned for say unit 3 might also be used in unit 5 and beyond.*

**The Basics:** Don't cheat or plagiarize on *any assignments*. Plagiarizing **any source** will result in a failing grade. Graduate students are held to a higher standard than undergraduates, so if you have questions about exactly what that means, ask me. And, most importantly, **KEEP UP WITH THE READING**. If you do this you will find this class both educational and easy. Indeed, it should serve you well come comps.

**Requirements:** There are two sets of requirements in this course:

1. Reading and Discussion posts: As shown below there are 15 sections, each with 1-6 short writing assignments (30 total). For each assignment you will 1) make a substantive post demonstrating that you did the reading and 2) respond to at least one other post. I imagine this will total about 32 written pages, which seems very reasonable for a graduate course.
2. Psychologist biography paper: You will be given the name of an individual who made important contributions to the history of psychology and who likely shares some interests with you (based on information provided by you during the first week of class). Typically, this individual will not be covered in the readings for this class. You should search out three kinds of information about this individual: a) biographical material, b) papers and books written by the individual, and c) comments by others about the nature and significance of this individual's work, as well as other evidence of the person's influence. The paper should discuss both the life and the work of your person. It should be a maximum of eight (8) and a minimum of six (6) double-spaced pages, not counting your reference section. Important: All of the psychologists assigned did far more work in their lifetime than could be described in such a brief paper, thus a focus on some small aspect of the person's work is critical to success on this assignment. The paper should be structured as follows: biography (2 pages), focus on some

aspect of the person's published work (6 pages). What you select is up to you and should reflect your own interests. There is a tendency in writing these papers to present the individual in a largely positive light. In some cases, such an assessment may be entirely merited. But your job as "historian" in this assignment is to interpret the data as objectively as you can, and that means being critical when such criticism is called for. **This paper is due by 5 pm on April 8<sup>th</sup>, 2019.**

**Grades:** Your grade will be based on the two requirements listed above. Specifically:

1. 75% of your grade will be based on your best 26 post assignments. I start with the assumption that everyone has an "A," so all you have to do to make an "A" is not produce work that will pull that grade down. You will find me an easy grader if you take these assignments seriously, and this an easy course if you DO THE READING.
2. 25% of your grade will be based on your psychologist paper. Papers should follow the format outlined above and always be written in proper APA format.

*The biggest problem that people have had with this class in terms past is that they have not (demonstrated that they have) done the reading – especially the original source material – in their posts. So again, just a "wiki-level" gloss will not work in this (or hopefully any other) graduate level course.*

*And, if you do what I ask you you'll learn a lot and make a good grade. If you do not, you will not do well in this class. Did I stress that you really have to do the readings....*
